



Focus on the Family President Says Loss on Marriage Probable

im Daly, the President and CEO of Focus on the Family, declared that the opponents of marriage equality are being repudiated by young people and have "probably lost" on marriage.

Daly made the remarks in an interview in the June 4, 2011 issue of *World Magazine*, a Christian news and views magazine (WorldMag.com). Focus on the Family is a Christian organization and a leading funder of anti-gay attacks concentrated on denying same-sex couples the freedom to marry,

"We're losing on that one, especially among the 20- and 30-somethings: 65 to 70 percent of them favor same-sex marriage," said Daly in the interview. "I don't know if that's going to change with a little more age – demographers would say probably not. We've probably lost that.

According to a statement form Freedom to Marry, Focus on the Family and its anti-gay colleagues such as the National Organization for Marriage (NOM) still threaten to spend millions of dollars in 2012. Their goal is to add additional layers of discrimination to state constitutions thereby impeding the country's progress towards marriage equality and prolong as much as possible the exclusion of loving and committed couples from marriage.

Organizations such as Focus on the Family and NOM have the key shell-groups pushing discriminatory constitutional amendments in states such Indiana, Minnesota, and North Carolina, where couples are already denied the freedom to marry by statute, and funneling money to local entities and campaigns with similar discriminatory aims and rhetoric.

"Focus on the Family finally got something right – the American people are rejecting their anti-gay toxic rhetoric and punitive politics, and are siding with loving and committed couples seeking the freedom to marry," said Evan Wolfson, Founder and President of Freedom to Marry. "With six national polls now confirming that a majority of Americans support the freedom to marry, it's time for Focus on the Family and other anti-gay industry activists to move on and, ideally, redirect their resources toward tackling the real problems gay and non-gay Americans could be confronting together in these tough economic times."

Poll Shows Majority of Americans Support Freedom to Marry

allup has became the sixth national poll in the past few months to confirm majority support nationwide for the freedom to marry, corroborating the findings of a recent *Washington Post/ABC News* poll and others.

With support at 53 percent, the new Gallup poll, released May 20, found a nine percent jump in overall support since last year, showing accelerating growth in the number of Americans who believe in the freedom to marry for all loving and committed couples.



Kids with Lesbian Parents Show No Rise in Drug Abuse

Tew findings from the U.S. National Longitudinal Lection Family 2 Longitudinal Lesbian Family Study (NLLFS) show that there is no link between the homophobic stigma that teens of lesbian parents might suffer and develop substance abuse.

The NLLFS, now in its 25th year, is the longest-running study ever conducted on American l esbian families.

In an article published May 25, in overall life satisfaction. the Journal of Health Psychology, 17-year-old daughters and sons of lesbian mothers in the study who reported experiences of homophobic stigmatization did not report higher levels of substance

The study is the first to date to explore the association between homophobia and substance use in adolescents raised by lesbians. The families were surveyed about substance use, experiences of homophobic stigmatization, and

Their responses were compared to a demographically matched group of adolescents from the national Monitoring the Future Survey conducted by the University of Michigan with funding from the National Institute on Drug Abuse.

Compared to these adolescents, the 78 adolescents with same-sex parents were more likely to report occasional substance use but not more likely to report heavy use.

The study was conducted by Naomi Goldberg, MPP (Williams Institute); Henny Bos, PhD (University of Amsterdam); and Nanette Gartrell, MD.

"Most surprising was that we found no association between substance use and homophobic stigmatization or life satisfaction," says study co-author Naomi Goldberg, MPP. "This finding runs contrary to other studies that find experiences of discrimination and homophobia may be linked to increased substance use. It is possible that these families have helped their adolescents develop coping skills to remain resilient in the face of discrimination."



Moscow Police Break Up Gay Pride Protest

t least 18 gay rights protesters were arrested as they tried to stage a banned Gay Pride parade, including international gay rights supporters Andy Thayer, Dan Choi and Louis-Georges Tin; plus Moscow Gay Pride committee member, Anna Komarova and other Russian gay activists (names unknown).



Protesters described as neo-Nazis attacked gay pride marchers in Moscow on May 28. It is believed that Moscow police colluded with the anti-gay protesters, and 18 of the gay pride marchers were arrested. organization of Moscow Gay

Choi, a former U.S. military officer who was dismissed from the American armed forces because of his homosexuality, was violently manhandled by police. He was wrestled to the ground and punched and has some minor injuries.

Neo-Nazis made repeated attempts to bash the LGBT campaigners as they were being arrested and taken to police buses. Some of the campaigners were struck but none were hurt seriously.

Dan Choi and Louis-Georges Tin were being processed at Presnensky Police Station. They later appeared before a police court. Some others are were held at Tverskaya police station.

The Crocker Art Museum is celebrating Gay Pride Month with two special events being held as a part of their popular Thursday evening Art Mix and Open Art series.





A detail of the much larger painting *Stonewall*, by Sandow Birk. Off-angle photograph taken by Charles Peer.



Our Greatest Enemy

ome friends and I celebrated Harvey Milk Day by attending an event at the Crocker Art Museum to honor his legacy, his accomplishments, and the ultimate sacrifice he gave to better the lives of gay men and women.

It was a fantastic and tearful tribute to a brave man who. arguably, may be second only to Martin Luther King, Jr. in terms of leading a civil rights movement for a disenfranchised minority. As uplifting and poignant as this celebration was, I could not help but feel bewildered at the lack of attendance.

Sacramento is a city with a large gay population, who on any given night can pack any (or all) of the gay bars and nightclubs downtown. It is the capital of California, the eighth largest economy in the world, the state that historically drives change, both in this country and in the world. This is the very city where legislative battles that drive these changes are being fought, day in and day out

Granted, I don't do as much as I should to advance the fight for equality. None of us do. But I try to represent, at the very least, because there is strength in numbers. Strong and loud messages are sent merely by numbers, and the

message that I got at the Harvey Milk Day Celebration is that the gay population in Sacramento just doesn't care. However, there is no doubt in my mind that T-Dance was well represented on this very day.

The gay society has become one of ambivalence and apathy. We have become a society that no longer needs the hatred and prejudice and vitriol of our enemies to hinder the progress of equality. We are hindering ourselves.

We have become disengaged, and perhaps spoiled. As we surround ourselves with those that are accepting of our very being, we forget about those who wish to do us harm.

We live in a bubble, forgetting about places like Texas, where it is still legal to refuse service to homosexuals. Or Tennessee, where laws barring teachers from mentioning anything positive about is going to fight your fight, and homosexuality or historical homosexual figures are being considered. Or Wisconsin, where

laws denying homosexuals basic hospital visitation rights for their domestic partners are being considered.

We have come a long way, to be certain. But let us not forget that we are still under attack. Every single right that we, as a community, have gained is constantly under attack.


For every victory, there is a defeat. For every right we gain, there are rights being taken away. We cannot look at these as miscarriages of justice against a certain people, they are miscarriages of justice against humanity as a whole. Unless we stand up as a community, as a whole, we risk losing everything that people like Harvey Milk gave their lives for.

We are lucky to live in a state that grants us many of the same rights and protections as heterosexuals, but much of our own country is not as lucky. And our fight is NOT over. There are many radical, fundamental organizations within California that seek to destroy our gains.

Calling HIV Negative Gay Men: This is Your Time commentary by Mark S. King

This is directed to HIV negative gay men. Listen carefully. This is your time. I've lived with HIV **L** more than half my life, and people often praise me far more than I deserve, simply for surviving. They use words like brave and courageous.

You know what takes courage? Getting an HIV test every few months. You, waiting nervously while your most personal sexual choices are literally being tested, waiting to find out if you've been good - or if you're going to pay for a single lapse in judgment by testing positive, when the look on the faces of your friends will say you should

have known better. I have no idea what that must be like. I took the test over 25 years ago. The positive result was traumatic, no doubt about it, and I soldiered on during some awfully frightening times. But I have a significant

psychological advantage over my HIV negative friends: I only took that damn test once.

During all these years, I've acted irresponsibly at times or taken chances I hadn't intended. But there has been no further judgment from a blood test. That reckoning was faced long ago.

But you - whether you have been sexually active for a year or a decade - have very likely faced some tough choices and behaved wisely. You keep doing the right thing.

This is your time. The word courageous is for you.

If you don't define yourself, in large part, by the fact you are HIV negative, start now. It is your accomplishment. It says you are taking care. And it says you are eligible to participate in vaccine trials or mentor someone else trying to remain negative.

There is ongoing research now that is focused on HIV negative men like you. Exciting new studies are investigating drugs to prevent infection after something risky has occurred, while other studies have shown promise for a drug regimen that might block infection before it happens.

And right now there are vaccine trials waiting for men like you to help find the ultimate weapon against HIV. They need volunteers,

This is your time. This research is about you. This call to action is for you.

I can already hear the rumblings on both sides of the viral divide. People are so quick to take offense,

so afraid of being misunderstood, of being labeled or blamed or ostracized.

My fellow positive brothers are so bruised by stigma that it can be hard for them to lift you up. They've been rejected by you. They don't like hearing "maybe we should just be friends" and they don't like seeing "UB2" in your online profile.

People are so quick to take offense, so afraid of being misunderstood, of being labeled or blamed or ostracized.

> They might be positive as a result of one heated mistake, or due to sexual assault, or by trusting (or loving) the wrong person – and they deeply resent feeling judged.

Maybe they think your negative status is the result of pure luck, or that you don't like anal intercourse, or you're lying.

Meanwhile, your sacrifices go unrecognized. You've seen some

positive friends take early disability, hang out at the gym and get help with the rent. They receive so much support and empathy that it must feel like there isn't much left for you. Every year we all swarm the streets for the AIDS Walk, and you can't help but wonder if your parade will ever arrive.

These grievances and resentments give me a headache. It doesn't matter much to me who is most injured. How infinite is our compassion for one another? I don't care anymore who gets what. What matters most is who does what.

This is your time. This truce, this call to a higher purpose, is for you.

> You are fully human, like everyone else, my friend. You are courageous, afraid, selfish and compassionate. You make difficult choices and vou make mistakes. And we need you so very badly.
