

Peer Groups at the G&L Center Serve a Vital Function

If I hear one more person denigrate peer support groups, well, I just may ask them to take a long walk off ... Peer groups are key programs at the Sacramento G&L Center and have extremely positive effects.

Initial observations of youth group attendees show young LGBTQ people who are happier, more confident and less likely to engage in risky behavior than their peers who don't have the same social outlet.

Studies by Advocates for Youth and extensive research published in the last two decades, have definitively shown that peer

programs can have statistically significant effects on attitudes, norms, knowledge, behaviors and health and achievement outcomes despite the perception of non-effectiveness from funding officers, program planners and some educators.

One study Advocates for Youth examined was highlighted in a report published in the *Journal of Adolescent Health* entitled "Cognitive and Behavioral Adaptations to HIV/AIDS among Gay and Bisexual Adolescents." This study examined programs that relied on two equally important components to reduce sexual risk behaviors in the target

population.

The first was individualized HIV risk assessment and risk reduction counseling; the second was peer education in cooperation with social support group meetings. The evaluation of positive results attributed the statistically significant findings, in large part, to the opportunities

for healthy socialization with peers in safe environments.

The Sacramento LGBT Community Center is part of our community's public health system and needs to be valued as such. The Center improves the health and well-being of the most vulnerable in Sacramento's

LGBT community, as well as serves as a central hub of resources for the entire community.

Other program offerings – such as family building workshops, legal counsel and estate planning workshops – offer resources to LGBTQ families in a centralized location – a "one-stop-shop."

These programs and advocacy efforts on issues like marriage equality also have health benefits that have been recognized by the Gay and Lesbian Medical Association (GLMA). GLMA released a study in 2008

(and it's quite appropriate to bring up considering the recent U.S. Supreme Court hearings) that demonstrates that the denial of marriage rights to gay men and lesbians can negatively impact their physical and psychological health and well-being and that of their children.

The return on investment (ROI) of the Sacramento LGBT Community

Center is immense, and as a former youth group member and now board member, I ought to know.


Final Design for New York City AIDS Memorial Unveiled

Medicare's Transgender Patients' Policy Challenged

The NCLR, ACLU and G&L Advocates & Defenders have filed an administrative challenge to Medicare's ban on medically necessary healthcare on behalf of Denee Mallon, a transgender woman whose doctors have recommended surgery to alleviate her severe gender dysphoria.

"Medicare's categorical exclusion of this care lacks any scientific basis," said Shannon Minter, legal director at NCLR. "Study after study has shown that these surgeries are the only effective treatment for many patients suffering from severe gender dysphoria."

"What matters to us is that there will be a fair and scientifically based review of the ban," said Jennifer Levi, transgender rights project director for G&L Advocates & Defenders. "We don't think the medical data supports it and are hopeful that CMS will agree."

EQCA Receives Grant to Enroll LGBTs in Affordable Care Act

The California Endowment has made a \$250,000 grant to Equality California to educate and enroll at-risk and marginalized LGBT Californians in Affordable Care Act approved health care plans, under a campaign named "Health Happens With Equality."

EQCA will place primary emphasis on reaching LGBT people of color, and people who are transgender outside of major cities, as these populations are the most underserved by traditional health care outreach. For more information, visit www.eqca.org.

GOP Senator Becomes 50th to Support Marriage Equality

Illinois Republican Mark Kirk became the 50th U.S. Senator to support marriage for same-sex couples, and the second sitting Republican Senator to support the freedom to marry, following Ohio Republican Rob Portman's announcement last month.

"With Senator Kirk's support, the U.S. Senate is now ready to move to the right side of history in support of same-sex couples' freedom to marry," said Evan Wolfson, founder and president of Freedom to Marry.

Sen. Kirk made the announcement on his personal blog following a major stroke, saying: "When I climbed the Capitol steps in January, I promised myself that I would return to the Senate with an open mind and greater respect for others. Same-sex couples should have the right to civil marriage. Our time on this earth is limited, I know that better than most. Life comes down to who you love and who loves you back--government has no place in the middle."

Free Microchips for City of Sacramento Kitties

In 2012, 3,955 cats ended up at the Front Street Shelter, with only 92 being reunited with their owner. This is because the vast majority of rescued cats rarely have any form of identification. They arrive without a collar and very few are ever microchipped.

In the hope of changing those numbers, during the month of April, the City of Sacramento-Front Street shelter will be offering a "complimentary" microchip to any owned cat living within the city limits. City residents may bring their cat to the shelter Wednesday through Sunday from 12:00 to 5:00 p.m. for a free microchip. A suggested donation of \$5 would be greatly appreciated and proof of City residency is required.

The City of Sacramento Front Street Animal Shelter is located at 2127 Front St.

EQCA Announces 2013 Legislative Goals

Equality California has announced its sponsorship of five bills in the 2013-14 legislative session focused on reducing discrimination and improving the health and equality of LGBT Californians.

The bills include: The Youth Equality Act (SB 323); The Health Insurance Tax Parity Act (AB 362); The Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity Data Collection Act (SB 280); The LGBT Cultural Competency for Health Care Providers Act (AB 496); and The Gender Identity: Name Changes and Birth/Death Certificates Act (AB 1121).


Texas School to Allow Student to Wear a Dress to Prom

In a letter to the ACLU reversing its previous position, Spring Independent School District stated that Tony Zamazal, a transgender student at Spring HS, may wear a dress, pump-style shoes, makeup and a wig to the school prom on May 11.

A school administrator previously told Zamazal that wearing a dress would be "unacceptable" because boys have to wear tuxedos and girls must wear dresses.

"All I wanted was to get to wear a dress to prom, because I wouldn't have felt comfortable at all showing up in a tux," said Zamazal, a 19-year-old senior. "I'm so grateful that my school has agreed to let me be myself on such an important night."



Rachael Hudson is no stranger to watching budgets and finding ways to stretch a dollar, and she has found a new way to help Sacramentans give to the local charities that serve Sacramento's many communities, including the LGBTQQI (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, questioning, intersex) community)

As the operations manager at Gender Health Center (GHC), a non-profit organization that provides counseling and therapy services, Hudson and GHC recently joined Give Back 2 Sac, a program that connects merchants and service providers to charities to further its fund-raising efforts.

Give Back 2 Sac enables businesses to redirect money (a portion of credit card transaction fees) that would otherwise go to banks. Give Back 2 Sac organizers liken the process to a form of automated profit sharing.

"Our goal is to get as many businesses as we can to sign up for this automated

charity-giving program," said Scott Moore, founder of Give Back 2 Sac. "We ask the LGBT community and its allies to make a special effort to use businesses that support organizations that offer value and/or provide services to them. It doesn't cost anybody a thing."

"We're unique. We use Give Back 2 Sac in two ways," said Hudson. "We process credit card payments for our Gender Health Center clients so we (and they) are automatically donating to a charity. We also designated GHC as our charity! It's a very easy way to fund-raise and keep our services going."

The Rainbow Chamber and Sacramento

Gay & Lesbian Center also receive funds from Give Back 2 Sac.

"I'm really into 'local," said Hudson. "We need to ensure that our money goes back into the community and supports local activities, or they won't survive. When you purchase items or pay for services that are a part of your everyday life, you're donating to charity. It's the easiest way to give, and you're not spending a dime. You're just doing what you always do."

"Philanthropic support of the LGBTQQI community doesn't often make the news but it is a critical necessity to the future and well-being of Sacramento area residents," said Moore. "Do your part. Shop locally and support our local charities at the same time."



The Godfather of LGBT Marriage Equality

¬ veryone is predicting how the U.S. Supreme Court will rule on ✓on the some 200-plus possible rulings, we have already won.

Those two days of hearings on marriage equality had some LGBT activists so enthused with premonitions of victory that they were already handing out credit for victory - should it go to Evan Wolfson, Andrew Sullivan or even actor Rob Reiner?

The answer is, none of the above.

Each of them has added something to the battle, and each is an incredible asset to our community. If I had to vote for one of the three, it would be for Reiner, but none has much of a longtime history in the war to achieve marriage equality.

The Rev. Troy Perry, founder of the Metropolitan Community Church, does. He has been called, and rightfully so, "the Godfather of gay marriage." Talking about the battle for, or the history of marriage equality without mentioning Perry is like talking about the history of women's rights without mentioning Gloria Steinem, Susan B. Anthony or even Emma Goldman.

Perry literally has fought this battle longer and harder than anyone. Starting in 1970, across the country from one city to another, he applied for marriage licenses for the



Since no church in Montreal would marry them, Michel Girouard and Rejean Tremblay traveled to Los Angeles in 1972 to recite their vows with Rev. Troy Perry, founder of the MCC

members of his church, and even under the threat of arrest, performed commitment ceremonies for same-sex couples.

Most of that time, members of the LGBT community looked the other way, thinking it a fool's mission. He and his church were ridiculed by members of our own community. Most of the first same-sex marriage applications filed in states and cities around the country came from MCC.

But, Troy didn't leave it there: He practiced what he preached. After getting legally married in Canada to Phillip Ray De Blieck,

he sued the state of California to recognize his marriage. His co-plaintiffs were fellow longtime LGBT marriage activists Robin Tyler and Diane Olson.

That case literally set up the marriageequality issue in California and made other activists realize this issue was real. When the U.S. Supreme Court rules, it will be due to the diligence of the Rev. Troy Perry, who has fought the court as well as his own community on this issue for more than 40

In 1969, Perry held a meeting to organize his church in New York. That meeting was picketed by members of Gay Liberation Front and Gay Youth since, in the spirit of the day, it was felt that we didn't need a gay religion, since religion was responsible for most of the problems LGBT people faced.

Troy came out and spoke with several of the picketers and explained that there were many people out there who were believers in God, and while you might not win them to your cause, he could help them and bring them forward.

I was one of those picketers, and Troy and I have been friends since.

Tips for Leaving a Smaller, Greener Footprint

don't always consider myself a very "green" person, but I, more often than not, will think about the ramifications of what I do, what I consume and how much trash I create. Here are a few things I do on a day-to-day basis that help reduce the stress to this already stressed out planet.

• Use a Brita water filter for drinking water. Yes, there are still plastic filters to buy, but I don't change them out nearly as often as Brita says I should, and the water still tastes better than straight tap water.

• Use small grocery bags for garbage bags. I bought a small pail and line it with these bags, and while it does not eliminate plastic bag usage, at least

I'm not spending money on regular bags. I use square paper grocery bags for my recycling so I can just throw the whole lot in the recycle bin.

• Use washable dishes and silverware. Very few things seem more

wasteful to me than throwing away a bunch of paper and plastic eating devices.

• Keep, and use, the extra napkins you get from fast food restaurants. If you ever go through a drive through you know how many extra napkins they stuff in your bag. I keep a stack in my car and use them for facial tissue as well as napkins.

• Use a washcloth in the kitchen instead of paper towels. You can buy a five pack of washcloths for about the same price as a package of paper towels, and they will last for years. When you are done in the kitchen drape the washcloth so it can

dry, this will keep it from smelling. If the washcloth does start to get a little funky, throw it in the wash, maybe with some bleach. Also, if you are using a washcloth,

you'll be amazed at how clean countertops and stovetops can get with just the cloth and

the kitchen instead of





Attracting Backyard Polinators by Roddy Scheer and Doug Moss, EarthTalk

ttracting bees and butterflies to a garden is a noble pursuit indeed, given that we all depend on these species and others (beetles, wasps, flies, hummingbirds, etc.) to pollinate the plants that provide us with so much of our food, shelter and other necessities of life.

In fact, increased awareness of the essential role pollinators play in ecosystem maintenance - along with news about rapid declines in bee populations – have led to a proliferation of backyard

that protects wildlife through the conservation of invertebrates and their habitat. "Native plants are undoubtedly the best source of food for pollinators, because plants and their pollinators have

"pollinator gardens" across the U.S. and beyond.

"Pollinators require two essential components in their habitat: somewhere to nest and flowers from which to gather nectar and pollen," reports the Xerces Society, a Massachusetts-based non-profit

coevolved."

Any garden, whether a window box on a balcony or a multi-acre backyard, can be made friendlier to pollinators. Xerces recommends providing a range of native flowering plants that bloom throughout the growing season to provide food and

nesting for bees, butterflies and other pollinators.

Xerces also says that clustering flowering plants together in patches is preferable to spacing individual plants apart. "Creating foraging habitat not only helps the bees, butterflies and flies that pollinate these plants, but also results in beautiful,

appealing landscapes."

Along these lines, gardeners should plant a variety of colors in a pollinator garden, as color is one of the plant kingdom's chief clues that pollen or nectar is available. Master gardener Marie Iannotti, an About.com gardening guide, reports that blue, purple, violet, white and yellow flowers are particularly attractive to bees. She adds that different shapes also attract different types of pollinators, and that getting as much floral diversity of any kind going is a sure way to maximize pollination.

Another way to attract pollinators is to provide nest sites for bees - see how on the xerces.org website. The group also suggests cutting out pesticides, as these harsh chemicals reduce the available nectar and pollen sources in gardens while poisoning the very insects that make growing plants possible.

Those looking to go whole hog into pollinator gardening might consider investing \$30 in Xerces Society's recently published book, Attracting Native Pollinators: Protecting North America's Bees and Butterflies, which provides a good deal of detailed information about pollinators and the plants they love.

Gardeners who have already encouraged pollinators can join upwards of 1,000 others who have signed onto Xerces' Pollinator Protection Pledge. An added bonus is a "Pollinator Habitat" sign from Xerces stuck firmly in the ground between two flowering native plants so passersby can learn about the importance of pollinators and making them feel welcome.

• If you can, replace your old appliances with newer ones. A refrigerator that is more than five years old will use substantially more electricity than a new, Energy Star one will. A new dishwasher will use less water and electricity.

Sometimes you can get rebates from your power company to help offset the purchase price.

So, these are just a few easy ideas I thought I would share. With a minimal amount of effort, we can all do things to help keep this planet healthier, and keep more money in your own pocket.


